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



## May Flawthorns

May hawthorns or mayhaws are from the same family as apples and roses, so perhaps it comes as no surprise that they can be described as smaller than an apple tree with big thorns and fruits that look like rose hips or crabapples. Mayhaws are sometimes planted as security hedges to prevent people and animals from passing its dense, thorny brush. But, more than anything, mayhaws are treasured for their unique and useful fruits, which can be made into delectable jams, jellies, preserves and wine.

Name: Crataegus (Rosaceae family)

Fun Fact: Why we love it: The fruit of a May hawthorn is not only a culinary delight, but is also valued for its heart-friendly, medicinal properties.

Known For: Clusters of small, white flowers and tiny red fruits

Warning: While the fruit from this tree is considered a Southern delicacy, the seeds are extremely poisonous.

#### Selecting and Planting

Hawthorns are attractive, deciduous ornamental trees, many of which are suitable even for average-sized gardens. They grace us with their delightful, white flowers in spring and glossy fruits and autumn leaf colors in fall. And luckily, hawthorns aren't fussy growers, thriving in full sun or partial shade.

- 1. Plant bare-root trees between November and March, and container-grown ones in any season other than summer.
- 2. Dig a hole, 2 ft x 2 ft, and add a layer of organic matter (compost or well-rotted manure) to the base of the hole.
- 3. Place roots in the hole and adjust the planting depth so the tree is planted at the same depth as it was originally growing and the top of the roots are level with the soil surface.
- 4. Mix in more organic matter with the excavated soil and fill in the planting hole.
- 5. Stake the tree with a rigid tree stake and two tree ties so it is fully supported against
- 6. Water well and apply a granular general feed over the soil around the tree with 2-3 inches of mulch around the root area.
- 7. If planting in the lawn, create a turf-free circular bed around the tree with a minimum diameter of 2 feet.



Hawthorns are, for the most part, low-maintenance trees that need little care and attention once they are



Hawthorns require no maintenance or PRUNING except to remove dead or dving growth and to thin overcrowded and rubbing branches. If pruning is needed, it is best carried out any time from late autumn to early spring.






#### 4. Vintage Vibes



Want a great idea for a Mother's Day gift? Start by taking her to brunch at her favorite restaurant.

Then, present her with a gift certificate to purchase a new countertop. Her teary thanks will say you chose your gift wisely.

Before Mom sets out for the store that sells all things kitchen, help acquaint her with which type of counter will best suit her needs. It may be challenging to choose one hard material over another, especially if they all look wonderful. Jon Maraldo of F & M Tile & Terrazzo Co. Inc. of Fort Wayne brings his expertise to the table to help make a decision easier for Mom.

"Quartz countertops have become very trendy," said Maraldo. "They have been popular in the rest of the east and in California for at least 7 or 8 years and the trend found its way here," he said. "Also, the quartz manufacturers like Silestone, Ceaserstone, Cambria and Zodiaq, to name a few, are national and international companies... they don't have a manufacturer other than nature.

"The stone industry is more fractured; the quarries are not usually the exporter, importer and distributer like the quartz manufacturers."

Attractive options, which exist for countertops, include quartz, granite, quartzite, marble and soapstone, in that order, said Maraldo, adding that those were the most common countertops.

Other options for this big part of kitchen décor include butcher block, stainless steel, reclaimed wood, bamboo, domestic wood, laminate, ceramic tile, engineered stone, solid surface and concrete, to name a few

"Stone tops are a trend that is not only in demand but will add value to a home or office space as well as being timeless," said Mike Sorg of Classic Marble and Stone.

#### How long does it take to install a counter?

"When we field measure, we digitize the space and a kitchen could take a few hours to complete. Once we are installing, the homeowner should plan on a day to get his or her kitchen together on an average space," said Sorg.

More considerations before deciding on that perfect countertop:

- Get a decent sample size of the material.
- Does it come with a warranty? This is great to have if something goes wrong shortly after installation.

- Does the vendor sell sinks and accessories, too?
- Does the vendor offer warranties and repair services?



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# A No-Stress Approach to Distressing Furniture

Who says you can't have it all—at least when it comes to home decor? Distressed furniture is the perfect blend of rustic and elegance today's homeowners often seek. And the best part is you can get this coveted look for minimal time and money.


"In the design world, distressed furniture is considered rustic refinement," said Vicki Canfield, of Restore-It. "I feel part of the appeal is you can take an existing piece of furniture and change the look, no matter the style of the furniture."

In other words, those who curate their space with distressed pieces know that style and comfort go hand in hand, and some things do in fact get better with age. Weathered furnishings pack a serious punch when it comes to character.

So, where to begin? While there's no substitute for a professional job, Canfield says homeowners can learn the basics. The first order of business is to ensure that the piece in question is sturdy and can withstand the usage. All the additional abuse will only add more and more character over the years and create a custom look.

The following are Canfield's tips to get the job done.

1. Remove all hardware and then clean the surface with a rag to remove existing residue.

- 2. Sand the entire piece of furniture to break thru the finish layer. This process will allow primer and paint to adhere properly.
- 3. Apply a thin coat of primer. Allow to dry and follow up with paint coat. Ideally this is applied with a paint sprayer, but a brush or roller will get the job done. (The finish look will be totally different using these three tools).
- 4. Decide where you want the distressed areas to be. Usually they will be on all edges to some extent. For example, one side may be more worn than the other. The middle areas should have intermittent areas of distress. This will help it look more natural without showing any kind of pattern.
- 5. To distress the finish and give it a naturally weathered look, sand off areas to gently remove some of the paint and primer allowing the underlying wood to show thru. "This can be subtle or heavy depending on the overall look you want to create," said Canfield.
- 6. Finally, apply a finish coat of polyurethane for durability, from a matte finish to high gloss.

Versatility is the name of the game. Any wood species of furniture can be distressed. Nightstands are the perfect sized furniture for first-timers. And the investment is minimal. The cost of such projects is usually low and very few tools and materials are needed. However, the work can pay dividends


in the form of a one-of-akind item, with a vintage or rustic look.

Consider such a makeover if you're dealing with an heirloom or maybe a new-to you piece that needs more character. Your imagination is the limit. Where will it take you?



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## May To-Do's in the Garden plus Landscape

Now that the snow is gone (fingers crossed), and the dreary weather of winter has run its course, it's time to rejoice—spring is here! It's your yard's grand reopening, but there is a lot to accomplish before sitting back and admiring that beautiful lawn. Grab a pen and get ready to check these items off your list to prep your lawn and landscape for the warmer months.

Start with a little spring cleaning. Here, you'll get rid of dead plants and debris to make way for new life. After you've cleared out your yard of unwanted debris, rake through the yard to remove any remaining leaves and thatch build-up.

> Aerate your lawn to ensure it remains healthy throughout the season. You can do this yourself by renting an aerator or hire someone to do it, and while this isn't essential, it is great for your grass.

Quick tip: Don't worry about the plugs in the yard after aeration. Those little guys are actually good for your soil and redeposit nutrients into the ground!

Next, you can test the soil's acidity. Your grass' pH should be neutral, but if it's too high, you can lime your yard. This can be complicated, so ask a professional if you have questions.

If needed, use a pre-emergent and weed killer to prevent and eliminate unwanted crabgrass and

Fertilize your yard to kick-start growth.

 Be sure your mower is working, and trim the grass as needed. Since this is one of the most important tools to keeping your yard in tip-top shape, you may want to consider investing in new blades or an entirely new mower this season if yours is older.

Pull any remaining weeds, trim your trees and use a post-emergent, if needed.

Once you are ready to lay down new mulch, first edge around the flowerbeds for a clean, kept look. Choosing quality mulch is always better for your flowerbeds and well worth the investment.

 Think about how you will maintain the life of your garden and landscape. A sprinkler system is one of the more convenient ways to keep your yard alive and healthy, so consider an installation, or prep your already existing system for the spring. But of course, the old-fashioned water

hose or watering can will do the trick if that's what you prefer.

Now for the fun part: plant flowers and veggies.

Once you've prepped your garden and landscape for the season, it's time to think about pulling out other outdoor essentials, like patio furniture, a firepit, a standing umbrella and other lawn décor.

Sit back and admire your hard work, iced tea in hand.





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## Picking flowers for Mom in celebration of a beautiful spring

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Dennis Bowman, manager of the Fresh Design Room at Gassafy Wholesale Florist Inc. shared his preferences for cuttings.

"I would suggest hybrid lilies," said Bowman, "because when cut, you get days to weeks of blooms, plus a wonderful fragrance. I personally also love hellebores, which bloom in very early spring (January -March) and are long-lasting flowers. Also, they bloom at a time nothing else is blooming in the garden. Bearded iris is another very fragrant favorite."

Joanna Raber, manager of The Flower Shop, recommends the popular stock carnation roses as good cutters and fragrant as well.

Tips on keeping your cut blooms looking great for a longer period of time include cutting flower stems at an angle; strip foliage from stems; always use a very clean vase as bacteria may be lurking in dirty vases and may taint your newly-cut blooms. Also, tepid water is best used for cut flowers, and so is a tablespoon of sugar, which helps nourish the flowers.

Keep the vase away from direct sunlight or heat. As with flowers still in the garden, remove any dead blooms, and change the water every few days, updating flower feed and preservatives.

And whether you buy your flowers from a florist or grow them yourself, gather a few blooms and take them to Mom in person or note a fond childhood memory of you and Mom deep within your heart and display them yourself on your own dining room table.



- 4. Bake in preheated oven until eggs have set, about 30 minutes. Let cool for 10 minutes before serving. 1





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

Fields is the founder of the Good Life Project, a global organization dedicated to improving quality of life.



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


What's more, doing it yourself can create more work in the end for both parties, in terms of damage control. For example, a paint job gone awry can require a lot of extra work.
